9.30am Session 2: Changing the world of work: "Winds of change: the SPES framework" - Prof. Mario Biggeri [economy and spirituality part 1]

Mario Biggeri is Full Professor in Applied Economics at the Department of Science for Economics and Business at the University of Florence. He has been a fellow of the Human Development and Capabilities Association since 2010. He is author and co-author of 21 books and over 50 publications in international scientific journals. He is also Vice-President of the Graduate Degree Course SECI — Sustainable Development, Cooperation and Conflict Management at the University of Florence. Since 2010 he has been a fellow of the Human Development and Capabilities Association. His research focuses on multidimensional analysis and measurement of sustainable human development processes and poverty, international cooperation, 2030 Agenda, impact assessments, capability approach, welfare of children and persons with disabilities, social innovation, collective action, evolution of informal activities and clustering of small and medium-sized enterprises, integral human development at local level. He is the Scientific Director of ARCO (at PIN -Polo Universitario della Città di Prato) and of the Yunus Social Business Centre University of Florence. He is the Principal Investigator of the Horizon Europe SPES project — Sustainability performances, evidence and scenario — and of WP4 (Spoke 10) of THE Tuscany Health Ecosystem project financed by NPRR.

as a Christian Concern" by Barbara Niedźwiedzka and Estela Torres

Prof. Barbara Niedzwiedzka is an Information science specialist, the Laudato si' Movement Animator, animal welfare activist and the leader of the group "Christians for Animals - Poland". She is the author of the Polish report "Catholics and God's animals' ', and many articles and meditations connected with humans - animals relations from the Christian perspective. She writes and provides resources on her website - OPOWIEDZZWIERZE.PL - www.opowiedzzwierze.pl, an integral ecology web site OUR COMMON HOME - https://www.klubtygodnika.pl/nasz-wspolny-dom/ and a site CARE FOR CREATION - https://kongreskk.pl/2021/03/05/troska-o-stworzenie/. Lives in Krakow, Poland. Estela Torres, an independent artist born in Mexico, has resided in France since 2001. She co-founded the Christian animal advocacy organization FRA - Fraternité pour le respect animal in 2016 and has led the organization since 2017 (https://fra-respect-animal.org/). Her responsibilities include overseeing its website, promoting animal welfare, and supporting Christian animal advocates within the Christian community. Estela is known for organizing conferences and prayer groups focused on animals and the Church. She is an alumna of the CreatureKind program and was part of the 2020-2021 cohort (https://www.becreaturekind.org/). Currently, she is part of the 2023-2024 cohort of the Animal Chaplaincy Training program with Compassion Consortium (https://www.compassionconsortium.org/).

5.00pm Session 4 : The importance of rest: exploring the Sabbath tradition Br Richard of Taizé

Br Richard will guide us on a reflection on the importance of rest and dedicating time to God and share with us how the practice of Sabbath is still relevant for us today.

Brother Richard has been a member of the Taizé Community since 1979. Originally from Switzerland, he has visited South-East Europe extensively and developed Taizé's relations with the Orthodox world. A theologian, he has written several books inspired by his Bible studies with young people. As part of the ELSiA colloquium, he will talk about the seventh day of the creation story (Genesis 2:1-3), about God who knows how to stop; then he will comment on the resumption of Genesis 2:1-3 in John 19:28-30, and on the "great day of that Sabbath" (John 19:31). Finally, he will reflect on God's rest, in which we are called to participate today: "There remains a Sabbath-rest for the people of God ... let us therefore hasten to enter that rest" (Hebrews 4:9-11).
